Dr. Jonlee Anderle is the Regional Administrator for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration Region 5 (Great Lakes Region), overseeing the Federal highway safety programs in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin. He joined the United States Department of Transportation in 2018, after working more than twenty-five years in law enforcement, highway safety planning and grant management, and in academia in Wyoming.

He is a retired Lieutenant from the Laramie (Wyoming) Police Department, where he served from 1993 until 2013. He was a Drug Recognition Expert and Drug Recognition Expert Instructor for over ten years. After retiring from the Laramie Police Department, he served as the Impaired Driving Program Manager for the Wyoming Department of Transportation Highway Safety Office until 2017 and was an adjunct faculty member of the University of Wyoming College of Education from 2014 until 2018.

Dr. Anderle has a history of service and leadership in professional organizations to include the Iverson Memorial Hospital Board of Trustees, the Wyoming Governor's Council on Impaired Driving, the Wyoming Governor's Leadership Team to Prevent Impaired Driving, the Association for Educational Communications and Technology, and the Technical Advisory Panel to the International Association of Chiefs of Police Highway Safety Committee, and for the last eight years has been part of the team which regularly updates the national impaired driving curricula. In addition, he served on the ACPE Federal Credit Union Board of Directors for eleven years, including two years as the Chairman of the Board.

He is a graduate of the University of Wyoming with a Master's in Business Administration and a Ph.D. in Education with a concentration in Learning Design and Technology. His doctoral work explored the effectiveness of online and classroom training methods in delivering cognitive, affective, and procedural learning in an advanced roadside impaired driving enforcement training class. He was a recipient of the NHTSA Public Service Award in 2011, and a NHTSA recognition award in 2017.
